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Preservation of *Wakosho* Collections in Europe Remarks from On-Site Visits

In the Summary Report of the Visits, I Mentioned:

Restoration/Repair ≠ Conservation

- Internationally recognised understanding of preservation and conservation
- In the case of rare books
 - Do not restore
 - Repair, when it is inevitable, but as little as possible
- Restoration/repair often results in loss of historical evidence of books and manuscripts
- The principle of minimum treatment

Why Restore/Repair Books?

- Because damaged books look pitiful?
- To make them look better?
- To make them usable?
- In many cases, care and proper handling are sufficient to prevent further damage
- Make surrogates if books are consulted frequently

Importance of Care and Handling

Prevention first!

- Environmental control: temperature, humidity, light, air etc.
- IPM (Integrated Pest Management)
- Dry cleaning
- Proper handling--educate staff and users
- Use of protective enclosures








Problem of Paper Slips and Its Solution

Problem:

Migration of acid and lignin content of paper slips would damage original books

Solution:

- Record them.
- 2. Remove them
- 3. Keep them (e.g. in separate envelops)



Preservation for Use

- Development of preservation understanding in recent years
- Preservation enables your collection accessible at present and in the future
- Increasing accessibility of Wakosho collection is important

To Ensure and to Increase Accessibility of Wakosho Collection



- Condition of Wakosho collection
- Environmental condition, IPM, security, disaster planning etc.
- Usage, exhibitions, digitisation, protective enclosures etc. of your Wakosho collection
- Check periodically and continuously

- Too busy to look after your Wakosho collection?
- If it is the case, how about creating a 'Wakosho day' in your annual work calendar
- Concentrate on your Wakosho collection for one day a year



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University of Oslo Library

Old Japanese Materials in University Library

- Holds around 70 titles, 400 volumes
- Mainly printed books from Edo era
- Most of them are in basement storage without thermo-hygro recorder
- Others are in the special collection storage

Old Japanese Materials in University Museum

- Museum of Cultural History holds Japanese old materials
- Contains ukiyoe, maps, illustrated books
- Stored in remote storage space
- Many of them are digitised and can be viewed through Museum's website

Adviser's Comments on the Library Collection

- Brown paper to be replaced to archival box
- Paper slips
 - Take photo of the marked page
 - Remove from the books
 - Keep in a separate envelope
- Develop disaster prevention plan
- Regular (annual) check

Adviser's Comments on the Museum Collection

- Framed ukiyoe prints to be covered with acid-free paper or white cloth
- Make museum's digitised mateirals searchable via Library OPAC

Overview of the Collection

- Around 55 titles, 140 volumes of books mainly from Edo to Meiji eras
- Letters of Kawabata Yasunari
- Books and documents are kept on basement storage shelves



Removed book labels from spine without significant damage





- Bernard Leach Collection (33 titles in 75 volumes)

Improvements

- Catalogued on NACSIS-CAT and Aleph
- Inserted acid-free paper slip with call-number
- Stored in acid-free envelope or archival box
- Relocated old European books to storeroom
- All with the help of Keio University Library
